Chapter Grows Stronger After Joining IFC

Brothers, let me first start off by saying how good it feels to be sharing newsletters again. For a long time, our chapter had regularly distributed this semi-annual document to our alumni, but in recent years, we favored the use of our Facebook page for quick and easy communication. We have realized the importance of a consistent newsletter in order to properly share our business with our growing alumni association, and thus we are excited to bring back the Lion's Bridge as a regular occurrence.

As many of you know, the chapter decided to join the Penn State Interfraternity Council beginning in the Spring 2014 semester. Thanks to the efforts of brothers Kyle Feaster, Matthew Rathbun, Jack Cardello, and Aatish Bathija, who presented in front of the IFC Executive Board, we were unanimously accepted into the community as the 50th recognized fraternity at Penn State. We went through a one-year probationary period, led by Brother President Jack Cardello, in which we were essentially introduced to the new set of requirements and standards that are expected of all accredited Penn State fraternities. What this means specifically is that, in order for the IFC to recognize Alpha Delta Phi, we must submit a yearly report of our involvement in the areas of community service, philanthropy, academics, and educational programming. While these have always been important elements of our chapter since its founding, we have found it to be very motivating that we are a part of a larger Greek community that prides itself on these sorts of accomplishments. For instance, our 25-man chapter was able to record 232 accredited community service hours just during the Spring 2015 semester, largely because of the opportunities presented to us by the IFC. One example of this is participating in Greek Sweep, an event where fraternity men get together and clean up trash from the downtown area after big weekends like Halloween and "State Patty's." It obviously reflects positively on the Greek community at Penn State and gives us another chance to work alongside each other as brothers.

And so while the IFC transition has brought about new requirements, it has also added numerous benefits. The IFC helps us the most during recruitment, where we can finally be a part of recruitment events like the Greek Involvement Fair in the HUB. I cannot express how proud I felt to set up a table displaying our letters in a high-traffic area like the HUB and talk to waves of interested freshmen about who we are and what we do. This has been a great way to guarantee a good turnout for our favorite rush events later on, such as Poker Night and Bowling. In fact, our schedule of rush events has remained largely unchanged from the days when many of you had rushed, which is also something we pride ourselves on.

It has been of huge importance to our brotherhood that even though the IFC business does represent a new era for our chapter, we maintain and perpetuate the values upon which this chapter was built. As Alpha Delts, we all chose to join this fraternity for very specific reasons, and our incoming pledge classes all want to be a part of us for those same reasons. We still use the same processes to educate our pledges and to develop them into better men morally, socially, and intellectually. We have found that being an IFC fraternity has required us to compromise little to none of our business, but instead, it has allowed us to embrace the wide network of Greek men and women at Penn State and use it to further our own causes. We are still getting used to the processes and procedures of being an accredited fraternity, but ultimately, doing so brings us closer together as brothers adds value to our organization. And I have never felt this proud to work alongside such dedicated, well-rounded, and upstanding gentlemen in ADPhi.






Home Improvement Boosts Fraternity Morale

Over the past two years, Alpha Delta Phi has raised over \$21,000 for The Pennsylvania State IFC/Panhellenic Student Dance Marathon, also known as THON. THON is the largest student-run philanthropy in the world and is an effort to raise funds and awareness for the fight against pediatric cancer.

All proceeds raised for THON are donated to the Four Diamonds Fund at The Penn State Hershey Medical Center with more than \$26 million raised over the last two years. The money is used to provide financial support for the children and families affected by cancer, as well as to conduct research for a cure.

This past year brothers Jack Cardello and Brent Littlejohn were selected to dance on behalf of Alpha Delta Phi. Being chosen to dance is an honor and a feat. Dancers are required to be on their feet with no sleep for 46 hours straight over THON weekend. As Jack and Littlejohn danced on the floor, the rest of the brothers were located not far from them in the lower bowl, providing support, motivation, and entertainment over the entire weekend. This year we are hoping to have another two brothers represent Alpha Delta Phi on the floor. THON weekend will begin on Friday, February 19th 2016 and will conclude on Sunday, February 21st 2016.



However, THON is more than just a single weekend. It is a yearlong effort of fundraising with various events throughout. To start off the year, we as brothers go on three separate canning trips, where we leave the State College area and spend the weekend at the home of a gracious hosting family. During the weekend we can be seen on the streets, promoting THON to passerby and accepting donations in our rattling coffee cans. Canning weekends are some of the best times to further bond as brothers. We also host other fundraisers with local restaurants, attend the annual THON 5K, and work to obtain corporate donations. These events are all important in helping us raise more than we ever have before. This year we are taking on a very ambitious goal of \$20,000, For The Kids and For The Cure.

Recruitment Takes Priority, Does Not Disappoint

Alpha Delta Phi experienced one of their most successful years of recruitment throughout the Fall 2014 and Spring 2015 school year. In the very first weeks of the year, the active Alpha Delta Phi brotherhood had dropped below twenty brothers for the first time in many semesters due to a large presence of seniors who had graduated the semester before. However, the active brothers took initiative and ended up with the largest pledge class the chapter had ever seen in the fall and the spring. Overall, twelve new members were initiated into the brotherhood; seven in the fall and five in the spring.

The success of the year was due to many factors. Obviously the passion of the brothers was a huge component in the gathering of pledges since one of Alpha Delta Phi's biggest strengths is 'the mystic ties that bind us here.' Another reason the fraternity was successful was the dedication of the brotherhood in determining an excellent recruitment process. Joining the IFC was crucial to gathering dozens of names to come by the events. Two events that kicked off the fall recruitment were the Greek Involvement Fair and the addition of Alpha Delta Phi to the "Zone Days" program during Week One of rush. The Greek Involvement fair was held in the HUB and the event involved all IFC fraternities setting up a small booth where interested students could come by, read some history, meet some brothers, and finally decide

to give the rush chairs their contact information in exchange for literature on the upcoming events. The Zone Day was a similar event but was held at the Old Main Lawn with only a few other fraternities. The event was far more personal and catered (entirely paid for by the IFC). Overall, 90 names, along with contact information, were gathered.

The next few weeks were crucial being that the rush events were scattered through them. Keeping up with the tradition of past years, rushes were brought to bowling, participated in a poker night, and even enjoyed a traditional ADPhi social function. Events were all encompassing showing the rushes the houses, a party setting, a brotherhood event setting, and of course an introduction to the brotherhood. After bids went out, brothers Brian Stickler, Derek Lankeaux, Spencer Jackson, David Huber, Adam Groshek, Zach Scheffer, and Santo Spataro had decided to pledge.

Spring Recruitment was, as always, a very different atmosphere. Pledge classes are typically much smaller for all fraternities due to a decreased interest in rushing when compared to the fall. This however did not stop the brothers from holding a strong recruitment. Brothers relied on word of mouth and personal connections to spark the interest of the rushes. Brothers were encouraged to spend one-on-one time with a rush at least once a week.

Rush events included bowling, poker night, socials, and an invitation dinner in that order. Informal events were budgeted this semester to promote more personal connections with the rushes. The money was used to buy refreshments and food for football Sundays and other times where the brothers just 'hung out' with the rushes. At the end, brothers decided to give bids out to nine rushes; two of them however did not register yet. Luckily, since ADPhi had and has a great relationship with the IFC, the VP of Recruitment personally registered both of them. Both of them ended up pledging ADPhi. Overall, six out of nine students who received bids decided to pledge and five were initiated: David Mupo, Matt Golabek, David Smith, Chris Clemens, and Vince Ferraiuolo.

The Nittany Chapter of Alpha Delta Phi has made strong improvements on the quality of our recruitment process and we are happy to celebrate the twelve new brothers of our fraternity.

Depending on the size of your chapter, this annual check could have proven to be a large pain for you and your brothers. At Nittany chapter, we operate on a semester budget of about \$10,000. This goes toward recruitment programming, intramural sports, community service events, social functions, and other miscellaneous expenses. The reality is that more than half of our budget is sent straight through to International at the beginning of the fall semester, and only the remaining portion is truly available to finance brother activities. It has been the status quo to aggregate this money solely through active brother dues. In our current phase of growth, directly related to our transition into the IFC, our brotherhood has been faced with the challenge of adding many new activities and programs to our yearly schedule. As a result, it has been difficult to make strides as a fraternity while at the same time keeping the cost of membership at a reasonable amount.

One way to remedy this dilemma is to encourage the use of the 1832 Club. This program works by having alumni sign up to automatically donate \$18.32 from their bank account every month. The 1832 Club was active at Nittany for a few years, but about six years ago it fell under the radar and wasn't rediscovered until last semester with the help of Brothers Cozza and Farster. We would love to revamp the 1832 Club to make sure that brothers of future generations have a stable financial situation and are able to focus more on developing as a chapter instead of just making it through the year. However, we cannot do this without your help. Brothers, your contributions to the 1832 Club are extremely crucial to our growing chapter and we cannot thank you enough for your help and support!
